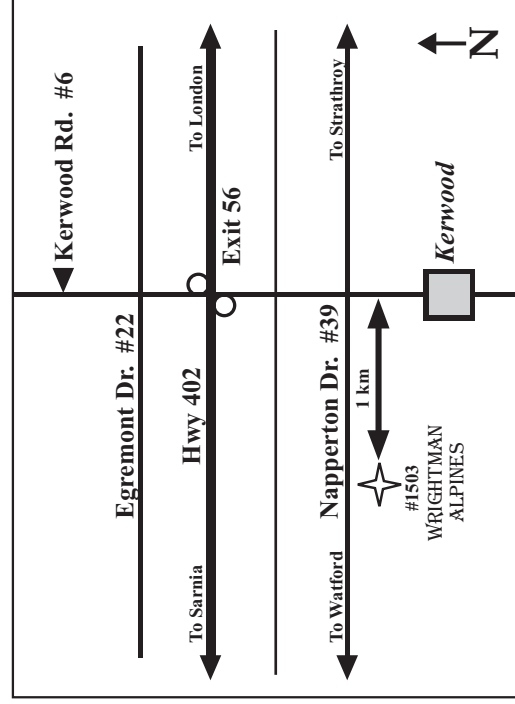


How To Get Here

We are located in Ontario, Canada, south of Highway 402, halfway between Port Huron/Sarnia and London. On Highway 402, take Exit #56, which is half way between the Watford and Strathroy exits. Turn south onto Kerwood Road (#6). Go about 3 km to Napperton Dr. (#39), turn west. We are 1 km along on the left. We are a 45 minute drive from the Bluewater Bridge border crossing at Sarnia/Port Huron, a 2 hour drive from the Windsor/Detroit border crossings, and a 2½ hour drive west from Toronto.

- V001 Valeriana arizonica** \$6
Dwarf carpet with shiny rounded leaves, fragrant pink flowers in springs; southwestern U.S.
- V002 Valeriana sp. 'Sakhalin'** \$6
Relatively slow growing, shiny green leaves; flowers are pink in large, attractive heads; I find this species to be the most attractive of all the small valeriana I have grown.
- V012 Valeriana supina** \$6
Small species (10cm) from Europe; rounded leaves. Cymes of pink flowers; trough.
- V023 Verbascum x letitia** \$7
Small, shrubby plant; spiny stems with blue/grey downy leaves; profusely flowering over summer with bright yellow blossoms ~2cm wide; 10-20cm tall, very hardy.
- V003 Verbena sp.** \$6
Comprised of prostrate stems which root to quickly form a solid mat; purple flowers continuously bloom from May to October. Very effective as a sprawling carpet, we use it as such in front of the crevice garden; hardy and perennial.
- V017 Veronica armena** \$6
Vigorous mats of short linear leaves; masses of blue in May.
- V004 Veronica bombycina ssp. bolcardaghensis** \$8
Mat forming with tiny, silver-felted leaves; covered with pure blue flowers in May-- a real jaw-dropper; plant in a lean, gravelly soil with plenty of sun; a gem from Turkey.
- V005 Veronica caespitosa** \$7
Small, soft, hairy cushions; sky blue flowers; Turkey.
- V006 Veronica liwanensis** \$6
Deep green carpets of shiny round leaves; bright blue flowers with a white eye.
- V007 Veronica oltensis** \$6
Carpets of minute, pinnate leaves; lovely azure blue and white flowers give a hazy effect in May.
- V011 Vitaliana primuliflora v. cinerea** \$8
Butter yellow flowers in profusion cover silver mats; absolutely gorgeous; excellent for trough.
- Y001 Yucca harrimanae** \$8
The doll's house yucca, growing to only 30cm; perfect for a dry slope.
- Z005 Zauschneria latifolia** \$7
A bright green leaved form that grows to ~20cm tall; rich, scarlet flowers in late summer and autumn. This is the hardiest form we grow.
- Z003 Zauschneria latifolia 'prostrata'** \$7
Very flat, slow growing form with red flowers.
- Z002 Zinnia grandiflorum** \$7
This is a zinnia so unlike its distant garden relatives; congested mats of contorted stems and leaves, gray in colour; large, clear yellow, single flowers are produced from July until frost; perennial and does very well for us. Should be in a very dry garden or larger trough.

A118 Androsace muscoidea\$8
Silvery green, stoloniferous mats; stemless lavender flowers; from drier regions of the Himalaya.

A150 Androsace ovczinikovii\$9
Dense, silvery cushions with heads of fragrant, white flowers often reblooming in September. A Halda collection at 3100m from the Gobi Desert side of the Mongolian Altai. We have grown this species in the garden for many years. It is one of the best and is very drought tolerant.

A011 Androsace robusta v. breviscapa\$7
Dense mounds of rosettes with an attractive frosted appearance; large, white flowers.

A154 Androsace sarmentosa\$7
From a wild collection at 3300m, Garwal. Soft cushions of lonate leaves, rose/pink flowers with a dark eye; spreads into larger mats.

A065 Androsace sempervivoides\$6
A neat, mat forming species with deep green, succulent leaves. Bright pink flowers on short stems.

A013 Androsace sericea\$7
From Tienshan, this species has attractive silvery leaves; white flowers.

A012 Androsace studiosorum\$6
A compact form with dense, woolly rosettes; dark, carmine flowers on 5cm. stems.

A162 Androsace tangulashanensis\$9
Tiny, tiny rosettes in dense clusters; stemless, white flowers; choice. From 4300m on Huashixia, Quinghai.

A188 Androsace tapete\$9
From 4800m Kangding, Sechuan, a very tiny contour forming mat to 15 cm wide eventually with white flowers; perfect trough specimen.

A014 Androsace villosa v. jacquemontii\$7
Originally from Ota Vlasak, this collection is stoloniferous and mat forming, but slow. Flowers are a vivid red-purple with greenish yellow eyes, quite striking.

A048 Androsace wulfeniana\$8
From Craven's in England; very tight cushions on green needles. Stemless pink flowers with a yellow eye. Native to the Austrian Alps.

A125 Anemone blanda 'enem'\$10
Collected by Janis Ruksans in the North Caucasus and named for a nearby village. The true species covered with absolutely pure gentian blue flowers in April. Easy to grow in gravelly/woody soil.

A128 Anemone coerulea\$8
Smaller flowered species with light blue flowers, from the Siberian Altai, humusy soil.

A086 Anemone deltoidea\$8
From Southern Oregon, this anemone spreads slowly in dry forest duff, pushing up stems with 3 leaflets. Large white flowers on 15 cm. stems; very hardy and attractive.

A242 Anemone nemerosa 'Viridescens'\$9
This is a plant that rates high on the weirdness scale - it is a double form flower with both white and green petals. The out of place chlorophyll draws your attention. A carpet of white flowers (with 6 or more petals), mostly pure white in type but is most strange. Even the most blasé visitor will stop and look.

A090 Anemone obtusiloba\$10
Growing in very wet meadows, this species resembles a small, bright blue buttercup. Flowers in this form are quite dark; given enough water, it blooms almost non-stop.

A098 Anemone parviflora\$7
Dark green, basal leaves; short stems bearing bluish/white flowers.

A083 Anemone ranunculoides\$7
From woody, rhizomatous roots emerge short stems with trilobed leaves, yellow flowers on short stalks. Grow in dry woodland.

A116 Anemone trullifolia v. linearis\$10
Originally collected by the Kunning/Gothenborg Botanical Expedition to North West Yunnan. In this form, the linear-spathulate leaves with a bristle of hairs, extend and arch over gracefully. Yellow flowers with a hint of blue borne on short stems; altogether, a very attractive plant only 12cm-15cm tall in flower. Grow in moist, gravelly/humusy soil.

S297 Selaginella rupestris\$7
Thick, low carpets of soft bristles. Native of dry, sandy areas in Eastern North America.

S281 Selaginella sanguinolenta v. compressa\$7
Densely cushion forming with tiny leaves forming soft domes; grow in humusy, drier soils in shade or part shade.

S298 Sempervivum arachnoideum 'album'\$6
A nice miniature form with pure white flowers, 3cm.

S078 Sempervivum arachnoideum Minor\$6
Green leaves with reverse red backings make up very small rosettes with inside cob-webbing.

S088 Sempervivum arachnoideum 'Pygmalion'\$6
Small, heavily webbed, intense red rosettes. Makes a nice little mound.

S040 Sempervivum arachnoideum 'Rubrum'\$6
Very tiny rosettes, red flower.

S085 Sempervivum arachnoideum x pittonii\$6
Tight, tiny, spherical rosettes that are hairy and backed in red.

S267 Sempervivum 'Belladonna'\$6
Large, soft purple/gray rosettes; pink flowers.

S154 Sempervivum 'Bronco'\$6
Bronze to purple sharply tipped leaves.

S084 Sempervivum calcareum 'Mrs. Guiseppa'\$6
Glaucous, pointed leaves with purple tips; neat medium sized rosettes.

S290 Sempervivum calcareum 'Pink Pearl'\$8
Large, slow growing, multi-coloured leaves of light green and pink shading to dark pink at the tips.

S266 Sempervivum 'Weirdo'\$8
Leaves sharply involute like; the early spring colour is gives a strong flush of purple/red, later showing more green- aptly named.

S209 Sempervivum x 'Aymon Correvon'\$6
Burgundy to soft pewter pointed leaves.

S283 Silene acaulis 'Anne Spiegel'\$7
A very small plant which makes very tight mats; pink flowers and easy growing.

S234 Silene acaulis 'Frances'\$7
A tighter selection with very bright green leaves and pink flowers; an excellent selection.

S050 Silene acaulis 'Grand Ridge'\$7
Hard, tightly packed mat of tiny green leaves; bright pink flowers on stems; lot's of bloom; good grower.

S299 Silene aff. davidii 'kanteensis'\$7
Josef Halda's collection of this high alpine silene in sichuan. Flat yellow-green cushion, of succulent leaves, large stemless purple-pink flowers. Very choice.

S260 Silene californica\$7
Numerous prostrate stems spread over the ground, bluish leaves with fine hairs; engine red flowers in early summer; hardy collection from higher elevation in the Siskiyous.

S321 Silene nigrescens\$8
Narrow, lanceolate leaves; white flowers have a large, inflated calyx with prominent dark stripes that are very striking; 8cm tall.

S300 Silene petersonii\$7
A resident of high, wind blown ridges (3200m) in the Wastach, large, thick root sends forth sprawling branches with gray, lanceolate leaves, clusters of purple flowers. A plant adapted to an extreme environment.

S049 Silene x 'Abbotswood Rose'\$7
Lovely, long flowering plant about 20cm tall; blooms of rose pink from July to October; valuable for its bloom and tolerance of dry soil.

S098 Sisyrinchium bermudianum\$6
Rush like grassy foliage; 7cm stems hold blue flowers with yellow eyes.

- A025 *Arenaria tetraquetra***\$6
Dense, hard green mat of tetragonus leaves; many white, stem-less flowers in May. Use as a mat to intergrow with something larger such as dianthus or bulbs.
- A095 *Arenaria tetraquetra ssp. granatensis***\$7
One of the tightest mats I have seen; ground hugging little hummocks of light green and gold; especially attractive growing on tufa. The white flowers are stemless ~1cm wide. Excellent for combining with other mats or to use as a "dry" underplant for bulbs or a small alpine campanula, gentian or primula.
- A029 *Armeria juniperifolia 'Alba'***\$6
A white flowered version with more glaucous leaves and condensed habit. It does best in very dry sand and full sun.
- A030 *Armeria juniperifolia 'Bevans'***\$6
Tiny form of this with rose pink flowers.
- A135 *Armeria scabra ssp. sibirica***\$6
An oddity from the middle Rockies found on drier areas of alpine tundra; flat tufts of short, grassy leaves; opalescent spheres on short 10cm stems.
- A170 *Armeria trojana***\$7
Tight cushions of linear, dark green leaves; bright pink flowers on short scapes, blooming throughout the growing season. A new introduction, very different from other armeria and as small as a. juniperifolia.
- A049 *Armeria x 'Little Penny'***\$6
A tiny new armeria with stemless crimson pink flowers on a tight mound of red-purple foliage.
- A181 *Artemisia frigida***\$6
A high collection ~3300m, Utah; small, woody crowned shrub with spreading branches of silvery blue-gray foliage; flowers are small yellow discs on 10cm stems.
- A056 *Artemisia pedemontana v. assoana***\$7
White, wooly mats, perfect to fill a vertical crevice. Yellow flower heads in June; 5cm; trough.
- A193 *Artemisia 'tiny green'***\$7
A very small plant which forms a mat of green filigreed leave; white flowers.
- A222 *Aruncus aethusifolius***\$8
Native to Japan and Korea; low mounds of finely divided leaves with airy plumes of white flowers over a long period; tolerates dry, shaded sites.
- A032 *Asarina procumbens compacta***\$6
Miniature form with the same large flowers, all summer. This one can be used in a trough.
- A033 *Asclepias tuberosa***\$6
Our native milkweed with brilliant orange flowers on July; about 50cm. tall. Grow in sand.
- A034 *Asperula boissieri***\$7
Our own introduction from seed collected on Mt. Parnassus, Greece; very dense, congested mounds of blue-gray needles; sugar pink flowers; one of the most desirable species, delightful in a trough or choice crevice.
- A239 *Asperula boissieri 'killini'***\$8
From Mojmir Pavelka, who provided our original collection of a. boissieri back in 1994 from Parnassus. This new collection by Mojmir is the Killini Mts. in Greece and is much more compact in character. Tiny silvery leaves with a hint of blue, rose-coloured flowers set close to the cushions. This is arguably the best dwarf asperula; 2cm.
- A044 *Asperula gussonii***\$7
Frosted hard dome topped with long tubular pink flowers.
- A063 *Asperula pontica***\$7
Dense cushion of green curls with a touch of frost on the margins. Long tubes of dark pink; excellent for crevice or trough.
- A057 *Asperula suberosa***\$7
Densely tufted mats; white, hairy, glaucous leaves. Clusters of clear pink flowers.
- A172 *Asphodeline taurica***\$7
Long, thin leaves erupting from the base of a thickened stock. The 40cm high flower spikes carry hundreds of stemless white flowers; an accent plant popular with garden visitors.
- A142 *Asplenium trichomanes***\$8
Dwarf fern of cool, shady rocks, native to Ontario; ~12cm tall

- S022 *Saxifraga 'Cambridge Seedling'***\$15
Small, silver encrusted rosettes with open, rounded light pink blossoms with intense orange-pink centres.
- S323 *Saxifraga cespitosa***\$9
One of the parent species for the "mossy" saxifrage hybrids, this diminutive species was North American collection is from Battle Harbour, Newfoundland and adapts readily to troughs or rock gardens; dense cushions of tight green leaves; pale yellow flowers in May; ~3cm tall.
- S105 *Saxifraga 'Cochlearis minor'***\$15
Easy growing, tiny sax with a fine spray of white blooms held on long stems. Rosettes are tight and heavily lime encrusted. In tufa block.
- S275 *Saxifraga crustata***\$15
Narrow, pointed, linear leaves with edges speckled in lime spots. 30cm red stems with creamy flowers.
- S316 *Saxifraga cv. (#1)***\$15
One of 2 sax. cv's growing in Barrie Porteous' garden since the 1980's; very silvery leaves and a coral-form branch structure. Flower colour not known yet.
- S011 *Saxifraga ferdinandii-cobrgi ssp. radoslavoffii***\$15
Very nice green, tight, stiff domes; clusters of bright yellow flowers.
- S111 *Saxifraga 'Galaxie'***\$15
Dense cushion of slim, tiny leaves. Large, striking apricot blooms.
- S024 *Saxifraga 'Harry Marshall'***\$15
Short 3cm stems displaying beautiful large white flowers with raspberry red anthers in early spring. Very tiny, pointed leaves form an extremely tight mound.
- S113 *Saxifraga 'Iris Pritchard'***\$15
Creamy apricot flowers with yellow anthers on thick, 7cm red stems. Slightly domed cushions; mint green, sharply pointed leaves.
- S312 *Saxifraga 'Josef Capek'***\$15
A rather slow growing cv with smaller leaves and overall size; salmon-pink flowers with a tinge of yellow. Josef Capek, a painter was a brother of Karel Capek the Czech writer.
- S117 *Saxifraga 'L.G. Godseff'***\$15
Elegant yellow blooms with bright yellow anthers on long 6-7cm stems. Tight mounds of sharp, dark green, shiny leaves.
- S118 *Saxifraga 'Lilactime'***\$15
Heavily encrusted, hard cushions; beautiful soft lilac-pink flowers.
- S010 *Saxifraga 'Lutea'***\$15
Silvery, flat, spatulate leaves. Slightly opened, light yellow flowers on red stems.
- S123 *Saxifraga 'Millstream Cream'***\$15
Large, enchanting creamy yellow petals are obovate and convex; held on red stems. Elongated caudices.
- S201 *Saxifraga 'Mother Queen'***\$15
Tight, juniper like leaves; deep rose flowers.
- S200 *Saxifraga 'Peach Blossom'***\$15
A Foster introduction; silver tinged, spiny rosettes; flowers are light pink.
- S075 *Saxifraga 'Petruska'***\$15
Tiny deep green rosettes create a tight, hard cushion. Long stems with very pale yellow flowers.
- S045 *Saxifraga 'Prensyl Orac'***\$15
Kraus cultivar. Strong growing saxifrage. Green pointed leaves; yellow flowers. Named after a mythical Czech character, somewhat like Paul Bunion.
- S128 *Saxifraga 'R.V. Pritchard'***\$15
Very tiny, pointy rosettes form a tight, dense mat. Pale pink flowers are large but delicate with orange red centres.
- S130 *Saxifraga 'Redpoll'***\$15
A cushion of tiny, tight dark green rosettes. Large deep pink flowers.
- S054 *Saxifraga sancta ssp. pseudosancta***\$15
Flat hummocks with prickly, lance-linear leaves. Fine yellow flowers.

C097 Campanula coch. 'Elizabeth Oliver'\$7
Tiny mat former, slender rhizomes with small rounded leaves; in this form the flowers are double and pale blue.

C122 Campanula fenestrellata\$6
Similar to *c. garganica* but more compact; doubly toothed leaves; blue flowers; 10cm.

C004 Campanula finitima = c. betulifolia\$7
Tufted Turkish species with prominently toothed leaves. In June, large bell shaped flowers, pink to red in bud, open white; spectacular when allowed to splay over rocks; easy to grow.

C079 Campanula 'Hilltop Snow'\$6
Stoloniferous mat former with pure white flowers.

C146 Campanula lasiocarpa\$8
A Haida collection from the Siberian Altai; dense cushions of serrate leaves; large upright lavender/blue bells for rich, moist soils.

C009 Campanula linifolia 'Alba'\$6
White form of this popular species which resembles a larger *c. rotundifolia*; very beautiful in bloom as the flowers sway in the wind.

C081 Campanula nitida\$7
Dense, dark green crinkled leaves to 10cm tall. Large blue flowers in June.

C064 Campanula raineri 'Case'\$7
Grayish oval leaves with serrate margins, larger flowers of light blue.

C164 Campanula trogerae\$9
A chasmophyte which given an elevated, exposed siting, will reward with a breath-taking display of absolutely huge white flowers, flung open to the awakening world.

C046 Campanula trogerae x c. betulifoliae\$7
A cross of 2 beautiful Turkish species. Small, tufted plant to 10cm tall; gray leaves; large open flowers of white with a pink blush; quite easy to grow and suitable for a trough.

C096 Campanula x haylo. 'Marion Fisher'\$7
A cross of *c. cochlearifolia* and *c. carpatica* having the diminutive nature of the former. Double, pure white flowers in abundance; easy to grow.

C116 Campanula x 'Mai Blyth'\$7
Tiny mounds of crinkled leaves; huge, open dark blue flowers that are particularly eye-catching.

C189 Carduncellus monspeliensis\$7
Dwarf, tufted with pinnate, spiny leaves; stemless blue flowers 8 cm.

C091 Carmichaelia nana 'Mt. Harper'\$10
Collected on Mt. Harper at 1800m by Chris Smart. It is like other *carmichaelia* in form- flattened stems with vestigial leaves and small decorative pea flowers, white with purple. The plant however, is a true dwarf and forms a small hummock under 5cm. tall. An excellent miniature broom for the trough or scree.

C055 Catananche caespitosa\$7
A tuft of linear gray leaves; prostrate stems of clear yellow, 3cm flower heads.

C066 Centaurea drabifolia\$7
Small tufted species with Dentate, leathery leaves with white tomentum. Spiny, yellow flowers on short decumbent stems. Long lived and very attractive in a hot, sunny site.

C180 Centaurea mucronifera\$8
White lannate leaves arise from a woody base; large, solitary rose/purple flowers on 10cm stems.

C018 Chamaebatiaria millefolium\$8
Native to the American southwest the fernbush is a graceful, hardy shrub with very finely-dissected, gray leaves; large spikes of white flowers, each one a little rose, are produced in July. We have a specimen in the garden now 10 years old and 80cm tall; a wonderful xeric.

C019 Cheilanthe lanosa\$7
The gray lip fern; bristly foliage to 15cm; grow in rich, dry soil between rocks.

C129 Chrysanthemum catananche\$7
Congested tufts of narrow silver/green leaves to ~15cm in height. Creamy flowers with a red eye.

C173 Chrysanthemum hosmariense\$8
Narrow, silvery, trifid leaves; large (4cm) white flowers with prominent silvery bracts, edged with black. A handsome, much appreciated plant that provides the much sought after autumn flowers.

P075 Ptercephalus pinardii\$7
Beautiful, mat-forming, woody plant; gray, divided leaves; deeply lobed, pink flowers in summer; silky seeds follow; Turkey.

P076 Ptilotrichum spinosum\$7
Dome of wiry stems and small gray leaves; completely covered with soft pink flowers.

P077 Pulmonaria altaica\$10
From seed collected by Josef Hald a in Siberia, this is one of the most attractive pulmonaria to be introduced. Not gaudy, just beautiful with large flowers of pure, coerulean blue over a period of 5 weeks in April and May. It grows to 45cm and has leaves which are pure velvet to touch.

P109 Pulsatilla vernalis\$8
A tiny *pulsatilla* with hairless, toothed leaves. Large, glowing white flowers look straight up from within the foliage. From the Alps.

P122 Pulsatilla vulgaris\$6
Large, sky-facing purple flowers on 15cm stems. A classic.

P269 Pyrethrum karelinii\$7
Collected high 4200m in Pamir Mt. growing granite crevices; large white daisies over grey, hairy leaves, very finely divided; to 12cm tall.

R001 Ramonda myconi\$9
Evergreen, hairy rosettes of leaves; flowers are widely open 3-4cm. across; this is a strong, easy growing strain; suitable for a choice crevice, trough or dry-wall.

R033 Ramonda myconi 'alba'\$9
Pure white flowered form.

R064 Ramonda myconi 'lavender'\$9
A selection we made of a seedling with flowers that are a vibrant, lusty hue of blue spectrum lavender. Outstanding!

R029 Ramonda myconi 'pink'\$9
A clone selected for its rose coloured flowers.

R027 Ramonda nathaliae 'alba'\$9
Smaller and less vigorous than *r. myconi*; grows into congested, leathery rosettes; short stems bear open, white flowers with a yellow eye; for a shaded crevice or trough.

R037 Ranunculus crenatus\$8
Small clumps of dark, glossy orbicular leaves, crimped at the edges. Wide (2.5cm) flowers on short (5cm) stems, pure white little buttercups in spring. Easy to please, grow in rich, gritty soils with adequate moisture; super trough plant.

R022 Ranunculus kochii\$8
A little bulbous plant from Turkey; glossy green articular leaves. Large bright yellow flowers with linear petals in early April, blooming with *corydalis* spp.; small enough for a trough.

R039 Ranunculus pyrenaicus\$8
Upright lance-like leaves with flowering stems to 15cm bearing several pure white flowers, each ~ 2cm across; grows very easily and endures drought.

R004 Raoulia glabra\$7
Bright green, hard mats; small heads of pure white flowers; hardy.

R017 Raoulia tenuicaulis\$7
Bright green mats with a touch of silver; white, scented flowers. For a trough or moist scree.

R038 Raoulia x petrimia 'Margaret Pringle'\$7
A natural hybrid proving to be a good doer; tight hemispherical domes of hairy, white rosettes, imparting a silvery sheen.

R049 Rhodiola rosea\$8
From a thick fleshy root stock arise stems with narrow, alternate leaves to 15cm. Terminal heads of yellow flowers.

R054 Rhododendron kiusanum 'Betty Muir'\$10
A selection of compact form of this wonderful Japanese species; ancient, gnarled branches, bright pink flowers, to 50 cm after 10 years.

R055 Rhododendron kotschyi\$10
Compact shrub growing to ~40cm tall. Grows in pine scrubland to open boggy pastures in the Balkans in limestone areas. Rosy-pink flowers in terminal clusters.

- D074 Daphne cneorum 'Porteous'** ○●●\$15
A form received from Barrie Porteous with tiny leaves and a ground hugging habit which follows the contours of underlying rocks. The wood is a particularly attractive mahogany colour; profusion of intensely fragrant pink flowers in May-June. This is very similar in appearance to the d. cneorum pygmaea, clone B described by Robin White in his recent 'Daphnes Guide'.
- D001 Daphne cneorum 'Pygmaea Alba'** ○●●\$15
Dense mat forming about 7cm high; white flowers.
- D004 Daphne domini** ○●●\$12
Wonderful dwarf shrub about 15cm tall; linear leaves and pink tubular flowers followed by bright orange fruits.
- D148 Daphne 'Kelsey Ann'** ○●●\$15
An excellent cross made by Rick Lupp of d. velenovskyi x d. petraea 'grandiflora'. Intermediate in form, with small leaves and fragrant pink flowers. It tends to sprawl like d. velenovskyi, but maintains a compact form - a choice gem for a trough.
- D124 Daphne velenovskyi 'Balkan Rose'** ○●●\$19
Choice dwarf daphne with numerous fragrant, pale pink flowers in May.
- D129 Daphne velenovskyi 'Old Port'** ○●●\$19
From the archive garden maintained by Barrie Porteous, this form is somewhat larger and faster growing with the same pink, fragrant flowers.
- D057 Daphne velenovskyi 'Rubicon'** ○●●\$19
Impossibly tiny, with large dark pink flowers - red in bud- with oblong leaves. Grow in crevice or a trough.
- D151 Daphne x hendersonii (ex Rick Lupp)** ○●●\$15
An unusual clone with arching branches, densely clothed with small, shiny leaves. Light pink flowers (fragrant) in May. A very attractive dwarf daphne cv. Growing to 20 cm tall. S/P/S, Sh, Sc, Tr
- D118 Daphne x hendersonii 'Ernst Hauser'** ○●●\$15
A cross of d. petraea x d. cneorum which has produced a number of garden worthy subjects. This is a vigorous clone that will grow to 40cm height; dark green leaves which turn purple/bronze in winter; red flower buds opening to pale pink borne profusely.
- D005 Daphne x 'Lawrence Crocker'** ○●\$9
A fine hybrid of d. arbuscula and d. collina; slowly spreading stems with long, hirsute leaves; dark pink flowers in spring, re-blooms sporadically with moisture, very easy to grow.
- D006 Daphne x 'Leila Haines'** ○●●\$12
A natural hybrid of d. cneorum and d. striata - this selection has a very small habit and slow growth (like d. striata) and dark pink showy flowers. Beautiful plant for a choice sunny crevice.
- D141 Daphne x 'Maisey Larae'** ○●●\$15
An excellent cross of d. circassica x d. arbuscula by Rick Lupp. Somewhat favouring d. circassica it has dark purple flowers borne on the stems of a compact plant. It is of easy culture.
- D140 Daphne x napolitana 'Meon'** ○●\$15
Bright green leaves forming low hummocks spreading to 40cm and 30cm high. Light pink fragrant flowers.
- D095 Daphne x 'Schlyteri'** ○●●\$12
A hybrid of d. cneorum x d. arbuscula makes compact mats of dark, lustrous green; very floriferous and easy to grow.
- D065 Daphne x 'Thauma'** ○●●\$12
Natural hybrid of d. petraea and d. striata. Dense mats of glossy green, covered with soft pink flowers in May/June, small mat ~8cm tall to 30cm wide; easy to grow.
- D119 Daphne x whiteorum 'Beauworth'** ○●●\$15
Strongly showing the d. petraea influence, crowded stems of dark green leaves and terminal flowers of rose/pink flowers; sweet fragrance, 25cm tall eventually.
- D149 Daphne x medfordensis 'Tichborne'** ○●●\$12
More compact than d. x 'Lawrence Crocker' growing to 20cm tall, rose/purple blooms in May/June.
- D012 Delosperma nubigenum** ○●●\$6
Mats of fast growing, bright lime green, fleshy sausage like sausages. Foliage turns red in the fall. Numerous glossy, bright yellow flowers. Very hardy.

- P038 Polygonatum humile** ○●\$7
A Japanese woodlander only 15cm tall; cream coloured bells in June.
- P282 Potentilla nitida** ○□\$8
Solid mats of trifoliate silvery foliage; large rose/pink flowers in June; grow in gravelly soils or between stones, the loveliest of its type.
- P222 Potentilla uniflora** ○□\$8
Very tiny mound of silky white leaves; solitary large yellow flowers on short stems.
- P186 Primula allionii 'Crowsley'** ○●\$7
Crimson-violet blooms.
- P050 Primula allionii 'Neon'** ○□\$7
Fluorescent red-purple blooms are long lasting.
- P163 Primula allionii 'S-MB94-7'** ○□\$7
Sister seedling of the superb p. allionii 'Neon'. Transforms from dark to bright pink as it ages.
- P062 Primula x 'Ethel Barker'** ○□\$7
Long, downy light green leaves. Freely borne flowers are a bright carmine, with a white eye.
- P063 Primula x 'Freedom'** ○□\$7
Hybrid of p. marginata and p. hirsuta, favouring p. marginata having serrate leaves; large, lilac flowers and toothed leaves.
- P045 Primula x 'Hemswell Blush'** ○□\$7
Vigorous, free blooming hybrid; pink-purple flowers with a pale yellow eye.
- P225 Primula allionii x 'Joan Hughes'** ○□\$7
Blooms of mauve/pink cover a small mound of crinkled leaves one of the best for show.
- P227 Primula x 'Kelsey Ann'** ○□\$7
From Rick Lupp, p. allionii x p. marginata; light violet with yellowish eye; blooms very heavily and late in season; easy growing.
- P104 Primula x pubescens** ○□\$7
Red-purple blooms in late spring.
- P051 Primula x 'Peardrop'** ○□\$7
Crimson flowers with a yellow eye.
- P102 Primula x 'Peggy Wilson'** ○□\$7
Short stemmed purple flowers bloom in late spring.
- P152 Primula auricula 'Arundel Stripe'** ○□\$8
Creamy flowers with thick, deep red stripes. Yellow eye, circled with a white ring.
- P059 Primula auricula x 'Cream Viscosa'** ○□\$8
Soft peachy-yellow flowers, floriferous.
- P259 Primula auricula 'Chorister'** ○□\$8
Deliciously thick yellow colouring with a bold white centre.
- P297 Primula auricula 'Cortina'** ○□\$8
A perfect, velvety, rich scarlet red self auricula.
- P316 Primula auricula 'Dr. Lennon's White'** ○□\$8
Delicate Border auricula, with umbels of large, white flowers.
- P232 Primula auricula 'Fred Booley'** ○□\$8
A floriferous and stunning double blue auricula, raised by Derek Salt.
- P294 Primula auricula 'Green Shank'** ○□\$8
Easy growing red-green auricula with a white centre.
- P317 Primula auricula 'Idmiston'** ○□\$8
Strong growing green edged, red petalled fancy auricula.
- P319 Primula auricula 'Joel'** ○□\$8
Deep violet-blue self with heavily dusted leaves. Very rich.
- P301 Primula auricula 'Lord Saye en Sele'** ○□\$8
Flowers have multi-coloured striping (antiqued red, yellow & green), with a clear white centre.
- P299 Primula auricula 'Marmion'** ○□\$8
Very deep red flowers with a green edge. Leaves have a light golden farina.
- P298 Primula auricula 'Orb'** ○□\$8
Wide clean green edge, with a nearly black ground that boldly contrasts with the white paste.

P137 Paeonia anomala\$15
A very cold hardy peony - its range extending from the Ural Mt. right across Siberia. Dissected leaves form compact bushes to 40cm. Drop-dead gorgeous flowers of bright pink.

P136 Paeonia peregrina\$15
Narrow leaves of vivid green. Very bright red flowers. Balkans.

P158 Paeonia tenuifolia ex JH98/157\$20
Fern leaf peony with brilliant glossy red flowers. Small clump forming; ~40-50cm high. A very good doer.

P173 Paracaryum racemosum\$7
A very handsome borage family member; arching branches with gray leaves to 20cm. In summer numerous racemes of deep blue flowers are produced, followed by ornamental, winged fruit. A wonderful new plant from Turkey.

P354 Paracaryum sp. 'Tahtali Dag'\$9
This a dwarf species collected by Mojmir Pavelka once on the slopes of Tahtali Dag at 2300. Blue/purple flowers adorn the miniature tufts of gray/hairy leaves. Grows well in rocky, limestone soils.

P307 Paronychia chionaea\$8
A Turkish species and counterpart to the European p. serpyllifolia; ground hugging mats of tiny leaves, lightly pubescent; clusters of silvery/white tissue paper flowers; a lovely, useful and non-aggressive mat to use as a foil for other gems like gentians and bulbs.

P012 Penstemon acaulis\$12
The dwarfest of all penstemons; tiny cushion of linear leaves, the oversize blue flowers sit in the foliage in June; the perfect trough specimen; I am sure it would do well in a trough on a balcony.

P016 Penstemon clutei\$8
Leathery, blue-green leaves are evergreen, perfect foil for it's rather bright pink flowers; very hardy, we have grown it now for 8 years outside.

P333 Penstemon crandallii\$8
Colorado species with low, arching stem covered with lots of bright blue flowers; 7cm high.

P084 Penstemon fruticosus v. serratus 'Holly'\$7
A superb woody species that forms low mounds about 20cm by 40cm. with evergreen holly shaped leaves that never burn; lots of large purple flowers in June.

P242 Penstemon havardii\$7
Elegant stems extending to 1.2m adorned with cardinal red flowers; great for humming birds; hardy with us for years.

P115 Penstemon linarioides\$7
Sprawling, shrubby mat from section caespitosi; gray needles and blue/violet flowers.

P021 Penstemon pinifolius\$7
Evergreen species composed of short upright stems, sheathed with fine, needle-like leaves; bright red, tubular flowers in summer; prefers heavier soils.

P309 Penstemon pinifolius 'Magdalena Sunshine'\$7
The typical needle like shrubs of p. pinifolius ~8cm tall; clear yellow flowers.

P022 Penstemon pinifolius 'Mersea Yellow'\$7
Pure yellow version of p.pinifolius; easy to grow.

P245 Penstemon uintahensis\$10
An endemic to the Uintah Mt., Utah ~3500m, small mats of shiny leaves with a leathery texture; short racemes of pure blue flowers; one of the prettiest small penstemons and easy to grow; a treasure for the trough.

P099 Penstemon virens\$7
Easy growing, yet stunning bloom filled penstemon. Glossy, mat forming foliage; deep blue flowers.

P252 Petrophyton caespitosum\$7
Tiny rosettes of small blue/green leaves slowing spreading into mats following the contour of the stones; white to light peach flowers on spikes looking like bottle brushes.

P212 Petrophyton hendersonii\$7
Low hummocks of tightly congested rosetted arrangements of the leaves on woody stems. In summer, flower stems elongate to 10cm terminating in a perfect "bottle brush" of tiny white flowers. Planted vertically in a wall, the effect is stunning; easy to grow.

D135 Dodecatheon jeffreyi ssp. pygmaeum\$10
Growing in wet, boggy places, this dwarf form has deep lavender flowers.

D026 Dodecatheon pulchellum 'Sooke Form'\$8
This very choice form is from southern Vancouver Is. From the basal rosettes of fleshy, glabrous leaves, short stems erupt bearing many large, magenta shooting stars. The most spectacular of all the dodecatheons.

D077 Douglasia nivalis (Chumstick form)\$8
Bluish white domes of elegant, narrow leaved rosettes; large, dark pink flowers on short stems a truly stunning androsace relative from Eastern Washington State.

D085 Draba bryoides\$8
Extremely dense pale green, hairy cushions, yellow flowers. A chasmophyte of moist cliffs in the Pamir, d. bryoides is easy in the garden. We have a plant in tufa ~5 years old which is 8cm in diameter.

D027 Draba compacta\$6
Densely tufted little hummocks; rosettes of dark green lance-like leaves; yellow flowers very early.

D093 Draba polytricha\$8
Easy growing draba. Hairy gray mounds; stemless yellow flowers; from Zigana Dag, Turkey.

D039 Draba sp. aff. cuspidata JHJ\$6
Compact mound of gray-green. Numerous yellow flowers in April. An attractive draba which slowly creeps over rocks; excellent for trough.

D108 Draba supranivalis\$7
I saw this draba growing in a trough in the Berkshires and found that its green leaved rosettes are as tightly packed as any d. bryoides or d. rigida; yellow flowers in April.

D031 Dracocephalum imberbe\$7
Dark green, kidney shaped leaves, many electric blue/purple flowers on short stems; Siberia.

D155 Dracocephalum multicaule v. setigerum\$8
A Jurasek collection from the slopes of Aras Dag, 2500m. Low clumps with recurved, slender leaves, large white flowers in typical, brooding mint fashion.

D145 Dryas octopetala 'Garden'\$7
A straight, ordinary form of this famous mat, at 3cm.

D034 Dryas octopetala 'tundra pygmy'\$9
A Halda collection, probably from the Altai in the late 1980's; this form makes the most magnificent carpets of tiny green leaves I have ever seen; huge stemless white flowers in June; the ultimate trough specimen.

D040 Dudleya cymosa\$7
High altitude collection of this wonderful lewisia relative. Tight, compact rosettes; orange red flowers, much admired by garden visitors.

E001 Echium amoenum\$7
A new Jurasek collection from the Caucasus; quite dwarf at 15-20cm. with densely hairy leaves and red flowers.

E056 Edraianthus montenegrinus\$8
Endemic to the mountains of Monte Negro, this species forms dwarf cushions of linear, green leaves to 4cm tall; solitary purple flowers on short stems; small enough for the trough.

E002 Edraianthus pumilio\$9
Perhaps the best of the genus- the large, rich blue flowers rest in mounds of thin, silvery leaves, only 4cm high. Definitely a trough item.

E061 Elmera racemosa v. puberulenta\$9
A close relative of heuchera, elmera racemosa is the only member of its genus. Native to NW America, it inhabits rocky slopes and crevices making compact mats of kidney-shaped, olive green leaves. Greenish-yellow urns are displayed on a 10cm stem; a little known but showy member of saxifragacea.

E025 Empetrum caucasicum\$10
Prostrate mat of intertwining stems with tiny dark green leaves; large ornamental black berries; excellent trough specimen. Another Halda collection from Mt. Elbrus in the Caucasus. A miniature shrub suitable for a trough.

J011 Jovibarba heuffelianus 'Steffan'\$7
Close sempervivum relative; tight mounds of light green, barbed leaves (hence the name). Tips turning maroon in fall and winter.

J005 Juniperus communis compressa\$8
A juniper of very slow growing, dense columnar habit. Grows to 30cm x 10cm in 10 years.

L040 Lamium garganicum\$8
A high elevation collection from Turkey, grows in scree conditions in full sun; low broad mats of hairy oval leaves to 20cm tall; masses of bicoloured pink/white flowers over a period of 6 weeks in late spring; easy to grow.

L003 Leontopodium alpinum\$7
The popular edelweiss, with soft woolly leaves; white flowers. From the Alps.

L023 Lewisia rediviva\$7
A dryland species from the Rockies; essentially it has a very thick caudex from which a tuft of new leaves appear in autumn through winter and spring, disappearing in late May. A few weeks later, huge (5cm), pink flowers appear resembling a miniature colchicum. Grow in very gravelly sand with no organic material.

L007 Lewisia x cotyledon\$7
Succulent rosettes. Large panicles of flowers on 15cm stems. Place in a crevice with shade for mid-day.

L008 Limonium minutum\$7
Tufted mound of tiny, spatulate leaves; airy spikes of lavender florets.

L031 Linum alpinum ssp. julicum\$7
A Jurasek collection from the Julian Alps. Smaller version than l. perenne with blue flowers.

L054 Linum boissieri\$10
A species between l. aetioides and l. cantense in size; large yellow flowers on very short scapes.

L011 Linum hirsutum\$6
Thick, woody central stem with radiating branches and soft, hairy leaves; large blue flowers in summer and later; new and very choice.

L059 Linum punctatum ssp. pycnophyllum\$7
Short arching stipes, with narrow leaves bearing large blue flowers; Aroania, Greece at 1900m.

L012 Linum rhodopaeum\$6
A smaller, neater l. capitatum relative, again a mound of yellow flowers in July.

L013 Linum tenuifolium\$6
Airy, decumbent stems lined with small needle-like leaves; lilac pink flowers 2-3cm across in summer.

L019 Lithodora oleifolia\$8
Hardy sub-shrub from Pyrenees; loose mounds 12cm high; profusion of pink flowers, aging to blue are borne in summer. Grow on coarse limestone gravel. Very drought tolerant.

L066 Lobelia siphilitica 'Mistassinica'\$8
A dwarf clone, reaching only 10cm with the same beautiful blue flowers of the larger forms. Native to Eastern North America.

L045 Lonicera crassifolia\$8
Spreading mats of shiny dark green leaves that remain through the winter; white flowers followed by blue berries.

L014 Lychnis vis. 'Kugelblitz'\$6
Compact clump of dark green linear leaves; cluster of bright red flowers on a stiff stalk, 12cm.

L032 Lysmachia japonica 'minutissima'\$6
Very attractive miniature plant; tight mat with yellow flowers; for a moist, rich soil in part shade.

M029 Matthiola trojana\$9
From 1700 on Kaz Dag comes this dwarf plant with tightly bound rosettes of dentate leaves covered with tomentum. Stemless pale violet/purple flowers on short stems.

M028 Meconopsis sp.\$9
A plant that caught Jurasek's eye, growing at 4400m in limestone scree on Batang in Sichuan. Central tuberous root with basal rosettes of gray/green hairy leaves; flowers stalks to 15cm. This collection has grown very well for us and is tolerant of hotter temperatures and is calciphilic.

M001 Mertensia asiatica\$7
Fleshy blue foliage, similar to a dwarf hosta and bright blue flowers in the spring. Easy to grow.

E071 Eromogone congesta v. congesta\$8
Small white flowers on short stems over a very compact mat of blue needles. Excellent companion plant to grow with gentians etc.; 7cm.

E070 Eromogone franklinii v. franklinii\$8
Collected by Ron Ratko in the Eastern Cascades and described by him as, "...the scablands version of arenaria hookeri." Dense prickly mounds with pearl like white flowers at 8cm in height.

E054 Erysimum caricum\$7
Little blue needles so thin that first guess is perhaps festuca; no other like it in cultivation, this excellent species collected by Pavelka is from Bakir Dag, Turkey at 1800m. 1cm yellow flowers on very short scapes.

E048 Erysimum kotschyannum\$7
An excellent selection of this dwarf Turkish wallflower, very tight and only 5cm tall. Bright yellow flowers with a sweet fragrance.

E047 Erysimum pulchellum\$7
From limestone scree on the Ulu Dag, Turkey, dwarf, dense cushion with yellow flowers. These Turkish erysimums are very useful in the garden and troughs, and intergrow well with other diminutive plants. The fragrance is intoxicating.

E017 Erysimum 'Turkish Delight'\$7
An unusual erysimum from one of the early Czech collections. Visitors always rave about its qualities; i.e. low, dark green mounds covered with very fragrant yellow flowers in April; together with the red buds, quite attractive.

E018 Eunomia oppositifolia\$7
Mats of fleshy, round, slate-coloured leaves on wiry stems. Dark terminal buds, which erupt in fragrant cushions of, light lilac/pink often just after the snow leaves; from Turkey. A slow mat former, particularly effective in troughs amongst tufa.

E046 Eonymus japonicus 'rykujo'\$7
Slow growing, congested leathery green leaves, tightly clothe the upright stems (~8cm tall) - prehistoric looking.

E019 Euphorbia capitulata\$7
Mat forming species from the Balkans. Composed of gray, fleshy leaves; orange-red flowers. This species, unlike so many other euphorbia is non-invasive and is actually a little slow to propagate.

E069 Euphorbia spinosa\$7
Small, domed subshrub to 20cm; yellow/green flowers.

F009 Filipendula palmata 'kokome'\$7
Basal, compound leaves; short stems (12cm) with pink flowers; very ornamental.

F010 Filipendula sp.\$8
A new, very tiny species from a collection from a Jurasek expedition to Kabardino/Balkaria. Collected at ~1700m., it has the typical soft fern-like leaves, but grows to only 15cm. Miniature plumes of white flowers.

F005 Fumana ex Halda coll.\$7
Prostrate branches with fine, soft needles of green; succession of attractive yellow flowers.

G095 Genista dalmatica\$7
I saw a plant in Barrie's Richmond Hill garden and just had to take some cuttings. A tufted shrublet growing to 25cm., the branches have both narrow leaves and many soft spines, golden yellow flowers in June, originates from Albania.

G065 Genista delphinensis\$9
Essentially, a tiny form of g. sagittalis, absolutely prostrate mats of curious, flattened stems with a few leaves; large yellow flowers. A choice collection by Holubec from higher stations in the Rhodope Mt.

G004 Genista radiata\$7
Has a wonderful, billowy habit which is accentuated by the secondary branches radiating from a central junction; very few leaves; terminal clusters of flowers of deep yellow.

G006 Genista subcapitata\$7
Tiny, decumbent shrub of gray stems and leaves; Bulgaria.

G028 Genista 'Vancouver Gold'\$7
Tight, very low growing mat covered in intense golden yellow flowers in the spring.

- G015 Geranium sessiflorum v. nigricans**●□.....\$7
A tiny clump of chocolate foliage sprinkled with tiny white flowers; blooms throughout the summer.
- G016 Geranium x 'Ballerina'**○●.....\$7
As lovely as the name, it forms neat clumps of glaucous leaves about 12cm tall; produces a succession of lilac flowers veined with purple.
- G040 Gladiolus imbricatus**○.....\$7
From Central Europe this hardy species has typical narrow, sword-shaped leaves to 45cm; delicate violet/purple flowers in summer.
- G069 Glaucium fibrilligerum**○□.....\$10
Flat, mint green rosettes; short (15cm) stems with large peachy-yellow poppy flowers. A delightful miniature version of the horned poppy from Pamir at 3000m.
- G031 Globularia bellidifolia**○●□.....\$6
Robust 8cm dark green clump with 2cm rich blue flowers.
- G032 Globularia cordifolia**○●□.....\$6
Dark green, glossy evergreen leaves on woody stems. Flower heads are 1cm powder blue balls.
- G072 Globularia repens 'nana'**○●□.....\$8
Another exquisite selection from Barrie Porteous, a tiny form of g. repens, already a very small plant, it forms thick mats of dark, evergreen leaves; sessile little powder-puffs dot the surface; for trough or scree.
- G027 Globularia sp. aff. repens**○●□.....\$7
Really a tiny subshrub as its stems are quite woody. The dark green, shiny, leathery leaves are an attractive mat, whether for its own miniature round heads of deep blue flowers or for crocus or corydalis growing above. Perfect for a trough.
- G089 Globularia stygia**○●□.....\$8
A dwarf form with glossy, spatulate leaves. Stemless, blue flowers. This species is as attractive as g. incanescens but has its own character.
- G074 Gypsophila aretioides 'Caucasica'**○●□.....\$7
An amazing hummock that flows over the ground and rocks; tiny dull green leaves that take on a bronzy hue in winter; white flowers in early summer; very hardy form from the Caucasus and much prized for the carpet it forms.
- G020 Gypsophila bungeana**○●□.....\$7
Halda collection from Abchasia; tight, dark green cushions, white clusters on short stems.
- G070 Gypsophila imbricata**○●□.....\$7
Very dense and compact cushions, like a condensed form of g. bungeana; sprays of pink flowers on short 5cm stems; small enough for a trough.
- G064 Gypsophila petraea**○●□.....\$7
Tufted perennial to 20cm, long grey/green leaves; globose heads of white flowers.
- H013 Haberlea rhodopensis**●●□.....\$8
Oblong, toothed leaves form dark green rosettes. Boldly flared violet flowers in the streptocarpus fashion; hardy and attractive gesneriad for a north or east facing crevice. See also ramonda.
- H039 Haberlea sp. Case**●●□.....\$9
Another collection from Fred Case which may be haberlea ferdinandi-cobourgii. Large flowered, easy growing plant. For a rich scree.
- H071 Halimium ocymoides**○●□.....\$9
Pavelka collection from hot, stony slopes of Sierra Cantabrica, Spain. Small shrublet ~30cm, woody stems with dense covered leaves. With its lovely yellow flowers one easily sees its relation to cistus and helianthemum.
- H018 Hebe 'Carl Teschner'**○□.....\$7
A mat of decumbent stems with beautiful violet flowers.
- H027 Hebe x loganioides**○□.....\$7
Short mats of heather like branches; white flowers.
- H045 Helianthemum apenninum**○●□.....\$6
Narrow leaves on woody stems in loose mats. Small enough for a trough; large white flowers.
- H001 Helianthemum canum v. balcanum**○●□.....\$8
Prostrate mat of gray leaves only 8cm high; numerous bright yellow blooms.

- H029 Helianthemum num. 'Annabelle'**○●.....\$6
A newer gray leaved hybrid with double pink flowers.
- H014 Helianthemum oelandicum ssp. oelandicum**○●□.....\$8
The real thing from Oeland Is., Sweden. Dark green leaves and an almost continuous bloom of large yellow flowers, very distinctively frilled along the margins. My favorite of this genus, it's flowers are very attractive and are produced non-stop.
- H048 Helianthemum 'Raspberry Ripple'**○●.....\$6
Low spreading mat; crimson with white stripes.
- H058 Helichrysum pallasi**○□.....\$8
A new collection from Berit Dag at 2900m. The individual rosettes of the tiny grey felted leaves cling tightly to the central stem making very dense cushions; large, single dark yellow strawflowers on scapes less than 4cm. Pavelka noted, "The best helichrysum I saw in Turkey". I might add, it is also the most miniature I have grown!
- H064 Helichrysum peshmenianum**○□.....\$8
Dense, narrow, wooly leaves forming a solid mat; single yellow flowers. From the stony slopes on Bolkar Dag at 2600m.
- H004 Helichrysum plicatum**○.....\$7
A Turkish species which grows well on hot dry stony gravel; very silvery foliage and yellow flowers.
- H017 Helichrysum sessiloides**○□.....\$8
Congested mounds of green leaves covered with white silky hairs. Lots of stemless white flowers. Helichrysum are perfect for trough culture; Halda collection.
- H015 Helichrysum sp. aff. pagophilum (JJH)**○□.....\$8
A really fine, growable high alpine from Halda. Dense silver cushions and yellow flowers sitting flat on the cushion. A definite trough specimen.
- H020 Heterotheca jonesii**○□.....\$6
Prostrate mats of woody stems clothed in gray-green leaves. Another show stopper, as the leaves just seem to glisten. Clear, yellow aster flowers on terminal stems are borne all summer and into November here. Also capable of creeping over rocks and conforming to the contours.
- H067 Heuchera abramsii**○●□.....\$8
According to Ron Ratko, "...the only population of a heuchera I have found growing in an alpine habitat..." - 9800' in the San Gabriel Mt. of California amongst boulders on north facing slopes. This is the dwarfest species with leaves only 6mm long; dense spikes of white flowers ~8cm tall.
- H052 Heuchera alpina v. cylindrica**○●□.....\$7
Small clusters of scalloped leaves; yellowish flowers.
- H007 Heuchera hallii**○●□.....\$7
Miniature species with white flowers 15cm. tall; from Colorado.
- H055 Heuchera parishi**○●□.....\$7
High collection 8300' in the San Bernardino Mt. amongst rocky drainages, basal tufts of dark green ovate leaves. Small white urns ageing to pink/red are in short dense racemes.
- H008 Heuchera pulchella**○●□.....\$7
Graceful 10cm. spikes of pink bells.
- H068 Heuchera rubescens 'Troy Boy'**○●□.....\$8
A super dwarf (10cm) selection of h. rubescens; pale pink flowers.
- H051 Heuchera x 'constance'**○●□.....\$7
Excellent dwarf hybrid with decidedly reddish leaves; very compact.
- H022 Heucherella hybrid**○●□.....\$7
A tiny trough plant ~7cm tall with lightly variegated leaves; white flowers.
- H078 Hibiscus moscheutos**○●.....\$9
A very large herb whose range extends into SW Ontario. Growing to 150 cm. It produces clusters of very large, pink, hollyhock flowers in late August and September. For the outer limits of the rock garden.
- H021 Hirpicium armerioides**○□.....\$6
Large white gazania type flowers, give a 'pleated' look with creases in the petals. Narrow leaves. Long blooming season.
- H009 Hosta sp. 'Mt. Kirishima'**○●□.....\$7
Wavy narrow leaves, purple flowers, late.
