<b>A001</b>	<b>Acantholimon armenum</b> Very dense, spiny cushions of blue-gray; pink flowers in early June. Easy and long lived; we have twelve-year old plants which have formed hummocks about 10cm x 30cm.	Sun	\$ 10
<b>A303</b>	<b>Acantholimon knorringianum</b> Spiny, large green cushions with very short stems of pink flowers. Pavelka collection from Tian-Shan, Kyrgyzstan; 2300m.	Sun	\$ 10
<b>A196</b>	<b>Acantholimon trojanum</b> Dense, silvery cushions with big rose/pink flowers ~10cm tall; from Kaz Dag, Turkey: 1600m.	Sun	\$ 10
<b>A107</b>	<b>Achillea aleppica ssp. zederbaueri</b> Tiny dwarf with dense, silver gray leaves to 7cm high; yellow flowers in a thick corymb. Choice and slow growing. Pavelka collection, Ojuklu Dag, Turkey.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A302</b>	<b>Achillea clavennae</b> Tufted silver mat of broadly pinnate leaves; clusters of white flowers to 25cm tall. From Julian Alps.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A321</b>	<b>Achillea gypsicola</b> Large, intense yellow flowers 10-20cm tall. Cushions of grey, linear leaves. From gypsum hills in Cankiri, Turkey; Pavelka collection.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A322</b>	<b>Achillea oxyloba ssp. schurii</b> Simple white daisy flowers (10-15cm high) on compact cushion of green, finely cut leaves. From the stony slopes of Bucegi Mts, Romania, 2300m; Pavelka collection.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A331</b>	<b>Achillea umbellata</b> A mass of silver and white – woolly leaves, stems of snowy flowers 10-15cm high. Grows amongst limestone rock, Aroania Mts, Greece; Pavelka collection.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A072</b>	<b>Achillea x lewisii 'King Edward'</b> Toothed, woolly, gray-green leaves form mats with 15cm flower stems that bear corms of pale yellow flowers, which age to cream.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A105</b>	<b>Adenophora takedae v. howozana</b> Campanula relative from Japan; slender arching branches with narrow, toothed leaves. Blue violet bells in very late in August-September; 15cm.	Part-sun	\$ 9
<b>A291</b>	<b>Aethionema armenum</b> Compact 10cm evergreen mound of soft pink blooms. Easy to grow and will gently self seed about. Jurasek collection from Turkey.	Sun	\$ 8
<b>A092</b>	<b>Aethionema grandiflorum</b> Sub shrub growing to 25cm. A lot of pink flowers ~1.5cm; from Turkey.	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
<b>A005</b>	<b>Aethionema ibirideum</b> Small growing crucifer with trailing stems forming loose mats; blue gray leaves and maroon stems; pink, fragrant flowers.	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
<b>A280</b>	<b>Aethionema saxatilis</b> Blue-green, thick (almost succulent like) leaves form a low mat of 10-15cm. Flowers are usually pink, but there is variability with white and mauve as well. Jurasek collection, 1700m Greece.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A277</b>	<b>Ajania af. scharnhorstii</b> Interesting little subshrub from dry steppe areas of Pamir, Tajikistan. Finely cut leaves; yellow button like flowers; grows to about 10cm high. Holubec collection.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A284</b>	<b>Allium beesianum</b> Very desirable thin leaved petite blue allium for rock garden and trough. A more than welcome bloomer in August and September.	Sun	\$ 10
<b>A289</b>	<b>Allium chrysanthum</b> Single bursting globe of sunny yellow spikes, held on elegant stem ranging in size from 10-20cm in height. Collections from S.W. China, Qinghai.	Sun	\$ 10
<b>A147</b>	<b>Allium flavum v. minus</b> Dwarf form from Turkey with umbels of bright yellow flowers; delightfully curled leaves, 12cm..	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A219</b>	<b>Allium forrestii</b> A diminutive species growing at 4500m on the rocky slopes of Beima Shan in Yunnan; big red/purple flowers on short stems.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A288</b>	<b>Allium kurtzianum</b> Dense pinkish-purple clusters in summer. Grows to just 10cm high; excellent trough specimen. Rare endemic of NW Turkey; Jurasek collection.	Sun	\$ 9

<b>A308</b>	<b>Allium macropetalum</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Juicy 'large flowered onion', with dark purple veined flowers of white to pale pink. Alpains collection from Grand Co., UT, 1341m; conglomerated sandy soils.		
<b>A307</b>	<b>Allium thunbergii alba</b>	Sun	\$ 8
	Just when you think the garden is done for the season, this easy to please gem brightens the day. Forms tidy clumps; stems 20cm high hold clear white blooms until frost.		
<b>A318</b>	<b>Allium thunbergii 'Ozawa'</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 8
	Just when you think all plants will have shut down blooming in the fall, this allium wakes up and gives you one last bouquet. And the flowers last for months, even after light frosts! Elegant 'Ozawa' flowers are held about 30cm high; rich purple with reddish undertones. Delicate, grassy leaves don't distract from the blooms. Very easy to grow, and the deer of course don't like them. From Gabriella Costea seed.		
<b>A194</b>	<b>Allium virgunculae</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	A very dainty allium with thin green leaves in a neat tuft bearing blue/purple flowers in the autumn until frost. Lacking a name only adds to its allure. 10 cm		
<b>A332</b>	<b>Alyssum aizoides</b>	Sun	\$ 8
	Loose, low (5cm) spreading cushions of small obovate silver-green leaves. From Ala Dag, Turkey; Holubec seed.		
<b>A324</b>	<b>Alyssum oxycarpum</b>	Sun	\$ 8
	Mounds of tiny grey green leaves with profusion of yellow blooms in early spring.		
<b>A008</b>	<b>Alyssum propinquum</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	Condensed mats of gray/green leaves and stems. Mostly spring flowering, they do resume growth and blooming from September onwards, staying evergreen through the winter and often flowering through the snow. Is tolerant of heat and cold; very effective in combination with acantholimon and dianthus.		
<b>A211</b>	<b>Anaphalis depressa</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	Dwarf, mat forming with silvery, downy leaves; white straw flowers in June; from Chola Shan, 4800m in Sichuan.		
<b>A333</b>	<b>Anaphalis nepalensis</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	The Nepal Pearly Everlasting; fuzzy lanceolate, silver-green leaves. Papery white flowers; 20cm tall. Sichuan, 3000m; grown from Pavel Krivka seed.		
<b>A137</b>	<b>Andromeda polifolia Ft. Chimo</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	A collection from northern Canada which has proven to be a good grower; needle like leaves of bluish green; pink flowers; 30cm.		
<b>A058</b>	<b>Androsace barbulata</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	Thick tufts of woody stems, wooly leaves, white flowers.		
<b>A216</b>	<b>Androsace globifera</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Halda collected seed of this species in Upper Burma on Mali Kha in a high alpine pasture (4800m); stemless, bright pink flowers sit atop tight cushions of hairy leaves, resembling a miniature form of a. muscoidea, very choice introduction.		
<b>A251</b>	<b>Androsace hedraeantha</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Clusters of 2-4 pink flowers on small green cushions, shiny, pointed leaves. 2400m; Sar Planina, Macedonia.		
<b>A139</b>	<b>Androsace helvetica</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Very choice, compact cushion to 5cm wide; hairy leaves. White sessile flowers in spring. Not the easiest plant to please.		
<b>A334</b>	<b>Androsace lehmannii</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 12
	Very choice androsace for its white to soft yellow blooms on tight, hairy cushions. Pavelka collection from stony slopes at 3300m; Tian Shan, Kyrgyzstan.		
<b>A155</b>	<b>Androsace mariae</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	An exciting collection from Sichuan; dark green cushions; flowers on short scapes range in colour from white to light pink. The expedition photos have pictured some lovely colours, as one collector notes, "all forms are very good plants."		
<b>A118</b>	<b>Androsace muscoidea</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Silvery green, stoloniferous mats; stemless lavender flowers; from drier regions of the Himalaya.		
<b>A010</b>	<b>Androsace primuloides 'Sheppard'</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	Large vigorous plant with many gray-green rosettes of elliptic leaves, each one producing, in May, a compact umbel of pink flowers with a yellow eye, lovely where given the room to form a solid carpet.		
<b>A283</b>	<b>Androsace robusta ssp. purpurea</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Reddish-purple flowers on tight cushions. Pavelka collection from 4000m Annapurna, Himalayas, Nepal.

	From a wild collection at 3300m, Garwal. Soft cushions of lonate leaves, rose/pink flowers with a dark eye; spreads into larger mats.		
<b>A065</b>	<b>Androsace sempervivoides</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 8
	A neat, mat forming species with deep green, succulent leaves. Bright pink flowers on short stems.		
<b>A186</b>	<b>Androsace spinulifera</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Leaves with spine-like tips arranged in globular rosettes. Long "summer leaves" are covered in silky hairs; dense umbels of magenta flowers on 12cm stems.		
<b>A188</b>	<b>Androsace tapete</b>	Sun	\$ 12
	From 4800m Kangding, Sechuan, a very tiny contour forming mat to 15 cm wide eventually with white flowers; perfect trough specimen.		
<b>A014</b>	<b>Androsace villosa v. jacquemontii</b>	Part-sun	\$ 10
	Originally from Ota Vlasak, this collection is stoloniferous and mat forming, but slow. Flowers are a vivid red-purple with greenish yellow eyes, quite striking.		
<b>A189</b>	<b>Androsace x 'millstream'</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Linc Foster's selection of a tiny garden seedling with dark green leaves and pink flowers.		
<b>A316</b>	<b>Andryala agardhii</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	Lovely foliage plant with silver, woolly leaves; yellow dandelion like flowers in summer. Grown from Piatek's seed.		
<b>A098</b>	<b>Anemone parviflora</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	Dark green, basal leaves; short stems bearing bluish/white flowers.		
<b>A270</b>	<b>Anemone rupicola</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	Deeply lobed leaves which are dark green and shiny - as though they just came through a spring rain. Stunning large (4-6cm) single white blooms. Growing to 15cm tall in rich meadows from the Himalaya to western China, this is a very showy plant.		
<b>A145</b>	<b>Anemone x lesseri</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 8
	A garden origin hybrid with shiny green, palmate leaves, to 15cm tall; many rose flowers about 2cm across.		
<b>A298</b>	<b>Anemonopsis macrophylla</b>	Part-sun Shade	\$ 12
	Incredibly elegant 'false anemone' that should have a place in everyone's shade garden. Nodding opalescent flowers resemble a cross between an anemone and a fuchsia, with light violet waxy outer sepals and an inner cup of infused deep violet. From woodland areas in central Honshu, Japan. Grown from a thick packet of seed Barrie Porteous sent!		
<b>A178</b>	<b>Antennaria aromatica</b>	Sun	\$ 10
	Mats of congested shoots with small, woolly, ash-gray leaves which have a distinctive citronella fragrance; white flowers with pink bracts. Native to the dry screes and gravelly flats of the Upper Beartooth, 3200m; Ratko collection. Excellent trough specimen.		
<b>A070</b>	<b>Antennaria dioica 'nyewoods'</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	A fine pink flowered form. Makes dense carpets of green and silver.		
<b>A015</b>	<b>Antennaria sp. (Beartooth collection)</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	Silver mat of geometrical leaves, very tight; white folwers.		
<b>A294</b>	<b>Anthemis cretica ssp. columnae</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	Tufted mat of silvery pinnatisect leaves; large 4-5cm white daisies on gracefully curved stems. Pavelka collection from 2300m up in the Kajmakcalan Mts, Greece.		
<b>A129</b>	<b>Anthemis marschalliana</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	Tufted mats of finely divided powdery white leaves, topped with deep yellow flowers- very striking; 7cm tall.		
<b>A325</b>	<b>Aquilegia akitensis 'rosea'</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	Striking colours for a dwarf columbine - warm rosy wine melds to soft canary yellow; about 10cm tall. Grown from Vladislav Piatek's seed.		
<b>A304</b>	<b>Aquilegia alpina</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	A compact plant from the Alps that grows to about a foot high with many large 5-8cm purple blooms.		
<b>A300</b>	<b>Aquilegia atrata</b>	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
	One of the darkest alpine columbines, deep wine to almost black flowers with prominent yellow stamens; grows 30-60cm high. Native to France, Italy, Central Europe, Slovenia, the Alps and the Apennine Mountains.		
<b>A286</b>	<b>Aquilegia barnebyi (mini form)</b>	Sun	\$ 9
	Miniature form of A. barnebyi - possibly genetic or from exposed conditions. Juicy dark peach sepals with yellow corollas. Alplains collection; Rio Blanco Co. CO, 2576m.

<b>A338</b>	<b>Arabis blepharophylla</b> Basal rosettes of unusually large, fuzzy and leathery leaves; magenta blooms in early spring. And endemic of California; will self seed if content.	Sun	\$9
<b>A021</b>	<b>Arabis ferdinandi-coburgii 'Variegata'</b> Waxy leaves with a yellow/green variegation. Useful mat-forming species; white flowers.	Sun Part-sun	\$8
<b>A329</b>	<b>Arabis scopoliana</b> Large flowers for an Arabis - 5 to 10cm across. Cushions of short green pointed leaves. Pavelka collection from limestone slopes in Vranica Planina, Herzegovina at 1900m.	Sun	\$9
<b>A254</b>	<b>Arabis x suendermannii</b> A lovely mat forming species from Rick Lupp with overlapping rosettes of elongated, lustrous green leaves; small white flowers. The visual texture of the mat is beautiful and unusual, especially for an arabis.	Sun Part-sun	\$9
<b>A041</b>	<b>Arctostaphylos uva ursi 'Wood's Red'</b> Excellent dwarf form. Mats of dark green leaves. Delicate pink lanterns followed by red fruits.	Sun	\$9
<b>A328</b>	<b>Arenaria androsacea</b> Grassy, liner leaves form a tight 5-10cm cushion. Jurasek collection from Gansu at 4200m.	Sun	\$9
<b>A108</b>	<b>Arenaria drypidea</b> Leaves arranged in a columnar fashion on short stems producing tight, globose cushions; somewhat like an acantholimon- an adaptation to cold dry conditions; white flowers with red spots; from Ercias Dag, Turkey at 2400m.	Sun Part-sun	\$9
<b>A312</b>	<b>Arenaria obtusiloba</b> Mats of trailing stems with tufts of short needles. White blooms in late spring to early summer. Alpains collection from Albany Co., WY, 3310m.	Sun	\$9
<b>A025</b>	<b>Arenaria tetraquetra</b> Dense, hard green mat of tetragonus leaves; many white, stem-less flowers in May. Use as a mat to intergrow with something larger such as dianthus or bulbs.	Sun	\$8
<b>A095</b>	<b>Arenaria tetraquetra ssp. granatensis</b> One of the tightest mats I have seen; ground hugging little hummocks of light green and gold; especially attractive growing on tufa. <b>A228</b>	<b>Arenaria 'Turkish Frost'</b> Grown from seed from a Czech collection in Turkey, this is not keyed out, but is so good that it must be listed. Narrow blades of grey/green form a dwarf, soft mound; many white flowers with distinctive purple striping are borne in the heat of summer making a valued addition at this time of year; 6cm. <b>A111</b>	<b>Arnebia echioides</b> A perennial borage with tufts of hairy dark green leaves. Short stems bearing sulphur yellow 5-petalled flowers, each with a distinctive brown dot. A standout for a rocky scree.	Sun Part-sun	\$ 15
<b>A056</b>	<b>Artemisia pedemontana v. assoana</b> White, wooly mats, perfect to fill a vertical crevice. Yellow flower heads in June; 5cm; trough.	Sun	\$ 9
<b>A193</b>	<b>Artemisia 'tiny green'</b> Unusual mat of green filigreed leaves in tiny marble sized balls.	Sun Part-sun	\$ 9
